## JYL Service Committee Supports Blues Marathon

For the fourth consecutive year, JYL volunteers greeted runners and handed out water. Gatorade, and GU Energy Gel at the Annual Mississippi Blues Marathon & Half-Marathon. Stellar weather, great runners and enthusiastic volunteers made for a wonderful event. Over 2,000 competitors from 47 states and several other countries, including the District of Columbia, Australia, England, Germany, Kenya and Ethiopia, registered to participate in the Marathon and Half-Marathon. Money raised by the event will benefit the Mississippi Blues Commission, which supports Blues initiatives throughout the state. In addition to supporting the Mississippi Blues Commission, the race's economic benefits to the Jackson area are significant. The Jackson Convention and Visitors Bureau estimates that the Blues Marathon contributed \$389,648 to the city of Jackson's economy in 2009, the most recent year for which data are available. With many more participants this year, the race likely brought a much greater economic punch. Not



only were JYL members able to help with the event, but it was a great way to celebrate the birthday of Mississippi native Elvis Presley and to celebrate the Mississippi Blues. #### **MEMBERSHIP & DUES**

Membership in Jackson Young Lawyers is open to any duly licensed member of the Mississippi Bar who is a resident of the greater Jackson, Mississippi metropolitan area and is either 37 years of age or younger, or has been a member of the Mississippi Bar for less than three years.

Annual membership dues are \$100 and are billed once a year for each member. (Membership dues are waived for government and public-interest employees in their first year of practice and are \$50 per year thereafter.) The dues cover JYL luncheons, newsletters, projects, and social functions during the year.


#### Author Curtis Wilkie Discusses Book at JYL Luncheon

JYL was privileged to welcome Curtis Wilkie, author of *The Fall of the House of Zeus: The Rise and Ruin of America's Most Powerful Trial Lawyer*, as the guest speaker at the January 7, 2011 meeting at Hal & Mal's. Mr. Wilike, a Mississippi native, spoke in front of a packed room, providing insight into his most recent book about the history of politics in Mississippi, culminating in the Dick Scruggs bribery scandal.

Wilkie pointed out that Zeus provides information that the average follower of the scandal was not privy to as the events unfolded in 2008 and 2009. His book is the product of hours of interviews with the characters and, as he noted, is written more from Dick Scruggs's point of view than other authors' recounts of the events.

Wilkie described Zeus as a





political story about how politicians have been scratching each others' backs and "fixing" things in this state all of his life. The Scruggs story is one that is bigger and broader than one criminal case. Many of the main characters in Wilkie's book are personal friends of his and, as he admitted, some have become former friends since the book came out.

Wilkie attributes the great success of his book to four

things: his own honesty and attempt to eliminate any bias while telling the story, cooperation by the entire Scruggs family, cooperation of the prosecutors, and that virtually every character in the book agreed to speak with him.

If you were unable to attend the January JYL meeting, you still have an opportunity to hear Wilkie speak in Jackson. Along with Alan Lange and Tom Dawson, coauthors of *Kings of Tort*, he will be speaking on Tuesday, March 15<sup>th</sup> at Millsaps College about the status of traditional media and how new media, such as blogs, affect public perception.

# Where Are They Now?

## With Former JYL President Wilson Montjoy

Wilson Montjoy practices law at Butler, Snow, O'Mara, Stevens & Cannada. He is recommended as a preeminent authority in LNG and pipeline matters and is an expert in tax planning and litigation. Chambers and Partners – the leading publisher of guides and directories for the legal profession – applauds "his great experience, his knowledge and his excellent connections in the industry." He is active in the community and has served the American Bar Association on the Board of Governors, House of Delegates, Nominating Committee, and as an officer of the Environment, Energy, and Resources Law Section and the Young Lawyers Division. Before then, he served as JYL President during the 1987-88 membership year.

**JYL:** As a former Jackson Young Lawyers President, what is your advice to young lawyers as they transition from law school to practice?

Wilson Montjoy: The law can be a great career, one which is very rewarding on many different levels. However, it can also be something less and there are too many lawyers, especially young lawyers, who are dissatisfied with the practice of law. While the factors that make the difference are many, one is passion. In the long term, your practice will be much more rewarding if you are doing something you truly enjoy. Certainly, in this economic climate, the initial objective may be to simply find and keep a job. However, as young lawyers mature in the practice of law, I encourage each to find out what excites and energizes them and to take steps to pursue their career in that area, even if it means a switch to another department in a large law firm or a move to a completely different practice setting. Chances are, you will become the finest lawyer you can be and will find the greatest rewards doing that which you most enjoy.

Additionally, keep in mind that lawyers are uniquely positioned to give back to their profession and to the public through pro bono work and other types of public service, such active involvement in bar associations and civic involvement. I would encourage all young lawyers to expand their ambitions beyond merely earning a living to include working to make a difference.

**JYL:** What philosophy defines you and your practice as you have grown from first-year Associate to Partner?

**Answer:** It's hard to say what defines me, but I would like to think that I always strive for excellence, from providing the most effective representation of the client to serving our profession, our community and those who need our help but cannot afford it.

**JYL:** What is your favorite thing about the practice of law?

**Answer:** The challenges. Our clients place a great deal of trust and confidence in us to help them achieve their desired objectives.

We are also often given the unique opportunity to work at the highest corporate levels or to serve individuals at times when their needs are greatest. Sometimes the challenge is to think out of the box and craft a novel solution, while at others it may be to achieve a result against the odds. Whatever the setting, applying creativity, intelligence and hard work to provide a solution to a client's problems or need is what I enjoy most.

**JYL:** What is your advice to young lawyers as they begin to deal with the stress of the practice of law?

Answer: There has been a lot written about life/work balance, and justifiably so, because it is a major challenge for all lawyers. Good lawyers are in demand and one thing that makes them good is that they place a high priority on promptly serving client needs. Also, any system in which one makes a living by selling one's time is bound to create conflict between time spent billing hours and time devoted to personal life. We all struggle with it. Just remember that one seldom looks back over a long career and wishes that he or she had spent more nights and weekends at the office. While maintaining an appropriate life/work balance is difficult, particularly in the seductive environment when more hours billed typically means more income, it is an issue which one must constantly address and lawyers must constantly remind themselves of the value of quality time outside the practice.

**JYL:** What is your advice to the incoming or current JYL President?

**Answer:** In addition to being a former President of the JYL, I have had the honor to serve as an officer in young lawyer and senior bar groups within both the Mississippi and American Bar Associations. Many of those organizations, like JYL, are voluntary bars. As such, lawyers have to be persuaded that it is an appropriate place to give their time, dues money and effort. Particularly in this economy, where there is such an emphasis on simply finding a job and earning a living, it is a challenge to compete for the time and membership dollars of lawyers. Consequently, my advice is to provide something of value. Bar associations can provide many things of value to lawyers, such as opportunities for professional advancement, networking opportunities, and opportunities to provide service to the profession and the public. Indeed, I have found that young lawyer associations, on the local, state and national level, are the places where much of the bar's public service work occurs. The JYL has a long tradition of providing value to its members and I encourage its current and future officers to continue that tradition.
